

Pupil Premium Spending 2018 – 19

For 2018-19 Manby Lodge Infant School will receive £30,178 Pupil Premium funding. This represents approximately 9% of the children on roll. Other funding from additional funding streams was added to this money to ensure that we could support other children from low-income families.

At our school the children eligible for Pupil Premium funding are diverse, and therefore it is more difficult to identifying common threads in the main barriers to educational achievement.

Mostly they are:

- a. Lack of vocabulary and oral language skills across the school, affecting reading and writing
- b. Attendance and Punctuality – A greater proportion of pupil premium children require additional support to main good attendance above 96% and to also ensure they come to school on time.
- c. Passive attitude towards learning – A greater proportion of our pupil premium children require an enhanced curriculum to ensure their learning is not passive.
- d. Parental Involvement – A greater awareness of the expectations of each Key Stage and Year group and to encourage a partnership in learning

We buy into a Home School Link Worker (HSLW) through our local Cluster.	£1500	All Year groups	The HSLW works with families to provide help, support and advice at challenging times. Works with small groups and with adults and children on a one to one basis. The HSLW is also able to source additional funding to support families in the community. The aim is to support families with their children's behaviour and attitude to learning. Parenting courses are also facilitated.	Academic progress is measured in school, on a termly basis. The progress of children in this group is also tracked teachers' pupil progress meetings. Pupil Premium cohorts are also on every agenda at Children and Learning governors' meetings. The social and emotional wellbeing of children is also closely monitored.

Emotional Literacy Support Assistant	£5000	All Year groups	The school has a trained ELSA who is allocated time each week to work with vulnerable children, delivering personalised interventions and support. Additional time is allocated to planning the ELSA sessions. The ELSA sessions address any barriers to learning which have arisen due to emotional needs or needs relating to social interaction.	As part of the process teachers are involved in evaluating the impact of all input from the ELSA. This enables us to see if there has been a direct impact on the social and emotional wellbeing of children who have accessed this support.
Intervention teaching assistants	£21,500	All Year groups	Trained Teaching Assistants lead interventions throughout our school. Interventions range from additional 1:1 reading with children, to additional writing and maths, using Word Shark, or other online games to support learning.	Academic progress is measured in school, on a termly basis. We plan for children to meet age related expectations, or to achieve exceeding. For those children working below age related expectations, we aim for them to make accelerated progress so that they are able to catch up with their peers.
Specific directed funding of School Curriculum trips and extra-curricular clubs, milk (for children aged 5 +), uniform when required	£3000	All Year groups	The school makes the decision to fund opportunities where applicable. No child forgoes an experience owing to financial hardship. Funding is made available for clubs if children fall into this category. On occasions school will buy uniform for a child if it is necessary.	We are always monitoring the emotional well-being of children. Taking part in extra curricular activities such as sports clubs after school can have a positive impact on a child's confidence and their ability to communicate with their peers. We hope that we are able to offer experiences to children that they may not otherwise have the chance to do.
